## **ACCESSIBILITY POLICY**

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#### 1. Aims

Under the Equality Act 2010, it is unlawful for a school to discriminate against a student, prospective student or member of the wider school community by treating them less favourably because of their:

- sex
- race
- disability
- religion or belief
- sexual orientation
- gender reassignment
- pregnancy or maternity

Schools are therefore required to have an accessibility plan. The purpose of the plan is to:

- Increase the extent to which disabled students can participate in the curriculum
- Improve the physical environment of the school to enable disabled students to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided
- Improve the availability of accessible information to disabled students

Norton Canes High School is committed to ensuring staff are trained in equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010, including understanding disability issues. The school supports all available partnerships to develop and implement the plan.

Norton Canes High School aims to treat all its students fairly and with respect. This involves providing access and opportunities for all students without discrimination of any kind.

This plan will explain the policy for accessibility and is available online on the school website, with paper copies available upon request.

Norton Canes High School's complaints procedure covers the accessibility plan. If you have any concerns relating to accessibility in school, this procedure sets out the process for raising these concerns.

#### 2. Current Range of known disabilities

- The school has children with a range of disabilities to include moderate and specific learning disabilities.
- We have a small number of students who have a hearing and visual impairments.
- We have a nurturing environment for students with speech and language and communication difficulties and social, emotional and mental health difficulties.
- We have students and parents who are wheelchair users.

#### 3. Legislation and guidance

The Equality Act 2010 defines an individual as disabled if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a 'substantial' and 'long-term' adverse effect on his or her ability to undertake normal day to day activities.

Under the <u>Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) Code of Practice</u>, 'long-term' is defined as 'a year or more' and 'substantial' is defined as 'more than minor or trivial'. The definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy and cancer.

Schools are required to make 'reasonable adjustments' for students with disabilities under the Equality Act 2010, to alleviate any substantial disadvantage that a disabled student faces in comparison with non-disabled students. This can include, for example, the provision of an auxiliary aid or adjustments to premises.

#### 4. Monitoring arrangements

This document will be reviewed every **3** years but may be reviewed and updated more frequently if necessary.

It will be approved by the governing board and the Headteacher.
